APUNYAL. 13 miles from Dalby b.300'. The receiving office opened August 11, 1913. It was designated a post office late 1927 and closed November 8, 1930. The office was run by the railway gatekeepers.

ARAMAC. See reference map. Aramac run was taken up by Rule & Lacy in 1863 and the T.R., proclaimed June 19, 1869, was on land resumed from the run. The post office opened March 1, 1874. The T.O. opened January 16, 1879 and a combined I&T office was formed that day. It was made official 1893 and transferred to the Commonwealth March 1, 1901. It became unofficial August 13, 1979.

ARAMARA. See reference map. The railway opened July 29, 1889. The receiving office opened June 9, 1899 with the gatekeeper, Mrs.Dale, as R.O.K.. It was elevated to a post office August 20, 1914. Temporary closure March 24, 1970 and permanent July 7, 1970.

ARANA HILLS. 7 miles from the Brisbane G.P.O. b.310'. The post office opened November 9, 1964.

ARATULA. 8½ miles west of Boonah. The receiving office opened at Carter's Gate in January 1912 and was elevated to a post office April 1925/6.

ARBOUIN. 28 miles from Chillagoe b.283' and 3 miles N.E. of Cardross. It was named after an early prospector. The receiving office opened Sept.1910-March 1911 and was elevated to a post office May 1912 with John Brady, storekeeper, as P.M.. The office closed about July 1913 (Cardross opened).

ARCADIA BAY. On Magnetic Island 9 miles from Townsville b.23'. Was first settled in 1888 as a holiday resort. The post office opened about August 1934.

ARCHER. 15 miles from Rockhampton b.155'. The receiving office opened about September 1906 and moved to the R.S. in 1924. Was designated a post office late 1927 and closed February 14, 1975.

ARCHERFIELD. 7 miles from the Brisbane G.I.O. b.179'. The official Archerfield Aerodrome P.O. (See Section 13) became the unofficial Archerfield office June 7, 1948 and closed September 29, 1973.

ARCHER PARK. A railway station in Denison St. a few blocks S.W. of the Rockhampton post office. The post office opened 1915 and closed April 1918/19.

ARGENTINE. 34 miles from Hillgrove b.60'. The town developed around the Star River Silver Mines situated between the tributaries of the Little Star River and Keelbotton Creek. The STAR RIVER post office opened June 8, 1882. On October 6, 1888 the I&T Department wrote to the Lands Dept. regarding the correct name of the mining town and were informed that it was Argentine. The name of the post office was changed to ARGENTINE late 1888. It was reduced to a receiving office February 1910 and closed Sept.1914-March 1915.

ARAMAC. See reference map. Aramac run was taken up by Rule & Lacy in 1863 and the T.R., proclaimed June 19, 1869, was on land resumed from the run. The post office opened March 1, 1874. The T.O. opened January 16, 1879 and a combined 1&T office was formed that day. It was made official 1893 and transferred to the Commonwealth March 1, 1901. It became unofficial August 13, 1979.

ARAMAC/MUTTABURRA

Telegraph.

A telegraph line from Tambo, via Blackall, the later site of Barcaldine, Aramac, Muttaborra and Ayshire Downs, near Winton, to Cloncurry was built in the late 1870's-early 1880's.

The Aramac Telegraph Office opened on 16th January, 1879, and that at Muttaborra on 31st October, 1881.

A line from Muttaborra to Hughenden was opened on 31st July, 1886. This line was later converted to a telephone line after a new telegraph line from Longreach via Winton to Hughenden made it redundant.

A telegraph line from Tambo, via Blackall, the later site of Barcaldine, Aramac, Muttaborra and Ayshire Downs, near Winton, to Cloncurry was built in the late 1870's-early 1880's.

Mrs Payne's sister Ettie (the late Mrs Walker) was the first Aramac girl enrolled on the Aramac Exchange.

The commencement of Telegraph facilities at Aramac are not known, but the Post-Master General's Annual Report for 1879 shows that the staff at Aramac consisted of one lines repairer in charge and one line repairer indicating that facilities were available before that date.

The date of the installation of the first telephone is also not known. It is said that the switchboard which was installed at the Aramac Post Office in 1908 had four subscribers namely: 'Bowen Downs', 'Barcoorah', Aramac Station and 'Stagmount'.

The demise of these staffed exchanges will be sorely felt in the two local communities which have lost so many other job opportunities with the closing of Banking facilities full time, Tramway Office, cafes (once three), Hotels (once four) and the present Exchange staff six permanent and casuals (five in Muttaborra) must surely be feeling glum.

One of the towns first storekeepers E Schneider, whose shop was near where the Aramac Cafe now stands carried on till 14.1.1879. W.H.Morrison was his successor and the remuneration was increased to £40 (\$80)

As from 1st January 1874 a weekly mail service operated from Clermont a distance of 200 miles by horse. The yearly mileage was 20,800 for a remuneration of £225 (\$450)!

As from 1.3.1876 a mail service was instituted between Aramac and Cork i.e. a property in the Winton district - Winton wasn't founded then. It was operated by horse once a fortnight, a distance of 265 miles with the salary of £280 (\$560).

The Post-master General's report reveals that a new building was erected at Aramac and possession taken in 1879. The Official Post Office was situated next door to the Police Station now occupied by the C.W.A. Hostel. About 1896 a new Post Office and quarters were erected in their present position at the corner of Lodge and Gordon Streets.

This building was transferred to the Commonwealth Government at Federation. The Post Office at the corner of Lodge and Gordon Streets was sold in 1914 to William Dickson, who re-erected it at the corner of Lodge and Kerr Streets, where Mr and Mrs Chum Chambers and family now reside.

The present Post Office and quarters were erected in the same year (1914) at a total cost of £1,646.10.0 (\$3293).

The Post-master of the now Unofficial Post Office is Mr. Ross Hopper, ably assisted by his wife Morelle. There are approximately 180 town subscribers and 60 party lines connected to the Aramac Exchange.
